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
AAG Launches Healthy Departments Website

Chicago: Mapping's Metropolis

t is perhaps no surprise that Chicago, as the preeminent American industrial city of the nineteenth and twentieth centuries, rose to early prominence in the map production and publishing industry. The 2006 AAG Annual Meeting provides an ideal opportunity to explore this geographic history and to also become more familiar with the city's place in the twenty-first century geographic technology industry.

According to Michael Conzen, the early evolution of the Chicago map trade can be broken into three parts. During the first or *incidental* phase which ran through about 1850, the city was without technical and commercial enterprises principally involved in mapping. In the *take-off* phase of the 1850s, specialized map making and retailing enterprises were established by recent immigrants to the expanding city, and during the *diversified* phase of the 1860s, production and distribution of maps in the city became split between various specialized individuals and firms according to their capabilities or intended markets. At this point, firms began to advertise specialized map coloring services; they also produced maps intended for transportation, real estate, or insurance markets. Following the Great Fire of 1871, many firms were

Bringing Geography Back to Harvard

am extremely pleased to announce that geography is returning to Harvard. After more than three years of study and effort by many supporters, including the AAG, Harvard University has approved the establishment of a new Center for Geographic Analysis (CGA).

In a formal public announcement on

October 20, 2005, Peter K. Bol, Harvard College Professor and the Charles H. Carswell Professor of East Asian Languages and Civilizations, was named the first Director of the Harvard University Center for Geographic Analysis. Peter, who has worked closely with the AAG during the establishment of the new Center, said his "aim

is to see the Center assist in research projects and teaching university-wide. During the last two decades the miniaturization of computer technology, the ability to carry out continuous-time monitoring, the use of GPS, the increased use of remote sensing, and growing sophistication of geographic information systems have made geospatial analysis a tool of tremendous value to the social sciences, humanities, and natural sciences and to the professions. But spatial analysis is not only a technology; it is a way of thinking about the relationships between things. It is not only a research tool; it can be part of an undergraduate education. I foresee a vibrant future for the Center."

Bol, a distinguished historian who also directs the China Historical Geographic Information System project which spans Chinese history from 222 BC to 1911 AD, added that, "Today researchers across the natural sciences, humanities, and social sciences are coming to recognize that geographic analysis can provide a common foundation for the integration of disciplinary knowledge about the earth and its climate, the evolution of its flora and

fauna, and the comparatively recent but extraordinary consequential development of human societies. This vision is at the heart of the CGA's mission in the university... Geographic information sciences bridge earth and planetary sciences, engineering, medicine and public health, sociology, law, political science and economics, and

> history and the humanities. The interest at Harvard in geospatial analysis, spatial modeling, spatial statistics, and geographic information systems (GIS)—which has been the foundation for the development of spatial analysis generally—has been growing quickly."

Harvard's announcement noted that modeling the

world computationally is a thorny problem for researchers across Harvard. Today more than twenty research projects at the Harvard School of Public Health depend on spatial analysis, all students in the Graduate School of Design are taught basic techniques in the field, and in the Faculty of Arts and Sciences geographic modeling is an essential technology in various disciplines.

The Center for Geographic Analysis was founded with the support of the university at the highest levels, including Harvard Provost Steven E. Hyman, who formed the "Provost's Committee on Spatial Analysis," an exploratory group with which I and others at the AAG have worked closely. Chaired by Peter Bol, this planning effort was truly university wide and interdisciplinary. Among the disciplines at Harvard involved with the committee were history, landscape architecture, political science, statistics, physiology, geology, environmental health, astrophysics, sociology, computer science, art history, library science, environmental engineering, English,

ost practitioners of geography "want to make a life, not just a living." In a 1972 article authored for The Professional Geographer titled "Geography and Public Policy," Gilbert White wrote, "Let it not be said that geographers have become so habituated to talking about the world that they are reluctant to make themselves a vital instrument for changing the world." Academic geographers are more willing than ever before to market our knowledge base, theories, and skills to business, industry, and government. And we are in demand more than ever. Tom Wilbanks listed three ways by which geographers contribute to the formation and evaluation of public policy...the laws, plans, actions, and behaviors chosen by government. First, our scholarly, refereed publications of research influence decisions indirectly. Second, geographers prepare reports for specific users, perhaps as consulting reports or reports on independent scientific review panels. This work ranges in visibility from the "gray literature" that is rarely seen by the public to highly visible National Research Council reports meant to provide a science-based guide for government agencies. Third, geographers may actually become part of the decision-making process through advocacy or political decision making. University of Buffalo geographer Meghan Cope conducts research on children's conceptualizations of urban space and two strategies that can help create child-friendly cities: youth councils that serve as advisory boards to municipal government, and a concept called "Youth Policy Filters," which resemble environmental impact statements but focus on how new policies and developments would impact children/ youth. By also getting involved personally (and getting her students involved) in these two strategies, Meghan is contributing to public policy formation in all three ways outlined above.

Geography can point to its share of visionaries who have had an impact on

public policy on a national or international scale. Consider for example, the work by Bob Kates and Gilbert White, for which they received the National Medal of Science in 1991 and 2000, respectively. Kates' longtime work on world hunger has been extended through the international Initiative on Science and Technology for Sustainability; he continues to connect science and policy in pursuit of sustainable

futures. Gilbert White's influence on federal policies on floodplain management, water use, and natural hazards is well documented. White was also entrusted with the National Academy of Science complex and controversial 1999 study on Middle East Water for the Future. Gerald Galloway has also contributed to federal

flood hazard management policy analysis, including the post-mortem on the 1993 Mississippi River floods and the decay of our nation's water infrastructure. In two books. Will Graf has evaluated the debate on public land policy between environmentalists and developers (Wilderness Preservation and the Sagebrush Rebellions), and multiple issues in the Colorado River Basin...the impact of dams and the causes and effects of arroyo cutting, invasive species, and soil/water quality problems from salinity, heavy metals, and radioactive materials. More recently, in a 2002 report for the Heinz Center for Science, Economics and the Environment, Graf switched from evaluating policy to describing how science can provide the policy basis for decision-making in the removal of dams. Similarly, Graf chaired the National Council Committee Research on Endangered and Threatened Species of the Platte River. The 2005 NRC report detailed the spatial-temporal linkages between upstream irrigation withdrawals and reservoir management, metamorphosis of the Platte River in Nebraska from a

braided to single-thread meandering channel, vegetation encroachment on the floodplain, and the loss of habitat for the whooping crane, other birds, and fish. Susan Cutter's views on hazards and risk, vulnerability science and environmental justice have received public airing in the national media; her opinions are now a regular part of the National Academy of Sciences Geographical Sciences Committee.

Dawn Wright served on the National Academy of Science "Needs for Coastal Mapping and Charting Committee" that evaluated public policy related to coastal mapping for hazards and homeland security. Their recommendations were shared with the President's Commission on Ocean Policy. The benchmark book authored by Jack Ives

and the late Bruno Messerli systematically took apart the internally consistent but externally inadequate "theory of Himalayan environmental degradation," helping to defuse international tensions in South Asia over flooding, sedimentation, and channel shifting.

Two best-selling books have promise for indirectly affecting policy by reaching a broad audience: Collapse: How Societies Choose to Fail or Succeed by physiologistturned-UCLA geography professor Jared Diamond, and Why Geography Matters by Harm de Blij. Diamond's tome proposes a five-prong model for why some societies fail...climate change, hostile neighbors, changes in trade partners, environmental problems (twelve specific ones), and failure of societies to respond to environmental problems. De Blij's volume presents the challenges of climate change, the rise of China, and global terrorism as threats to America, caused in part because of our geographic illiteracy.

Most geographers find an effective way to help form or evaluate public policy

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Dawn Wright to Speak in Presidential Plenary Session

he Presidential Plenary session, entitled, "Geography: the Original Integrated Environmental Science" and organized by Richard Marston, will feature Dawn Wright, professor of geography and oceanography at Oregon University (OSU). Wright, State whose research involves using GIS and oceanographic tools to map and study some of the most geologically active regions on the planet, will speak on the topic of coastal and marine spaces as fascinating settings to explore the integration of the physical with the human, and more specifically, how theories, concepts, and techniques of physical geography may be used to shed light on resource management issues or public policy.

The special Presidential Plenary Session will also feature speakers Jean-Paul Bravard (l'Université Lumière-Lyon), Carol Harden (University of Tennessee), B.L. Turner II (Clark University), and Stephen Walsh (University of North Carolina). (See the October 2005 AAG Newsletter for details.)

The session will present discussions of geography as the original place-based environmental science that integrates knowledge, theory,

and techniques from the biophysical and human realms. As noted by Marston, "Geographers possess an advantage in understanding human-environment relations because we recognize that processes are place-dependent and operate at multiple/interacting scales. Moreover, we seek integration of spatial and temporal analyses using modern qualitative and quantitative tools." In this plenary session,



five outstanding scholars will present examples and general observations on how they use concepts from both human and physical geography to solve complex environmental problems.

The 2006 AAG Annual Meeting will be held in Chicago in the Palmer House Hilton Hotel, located in the

heart of the Chicago. A host of special activities are planned for the meeting including the AAG Banquet featuring Victoria Lawson's Past President's Address, many field trips exploring Chicago's rich cultural and physical geography, and over 3,000 scholarly and research presentations. economics, anthropology, law, and geophysics. In 2003, members of the committee issued a "Report to the Provost on Spatial Analysis at Harvard University," in which they concluded that "We are entering an era that will see the integration of spatial data and spatial analysis into the study of society and culture and the physical and life sciences. Advances in fields such as quantitative geography, computational spatial analysis, remote sensing and computer graphics have propelled the development of new research tools to meet the needs of the earth and planetary sciences, medicine, health, design, and history (to identify a few fields) to visualize, synthesize, and analyze data. As a result, scholars and students are learning to apply analytic and descriptive tools of spatial analysis in ways that were not possible in the past. In the process they are discovering that the techniques for mapping the inside of the earth also apply to mapping the inside of the brain, that an historical spatial database of a region serves both art historians and demographers. The interest at Harvard in spatial analysis and geographic information systems (GIS)which has been the foundation for the development of spatial analysis-has started to grow quickly."

The prescient 2003 report to Harvard's Provost also recalled that "Our current state of affairs has its roots in 1948 when, before the appearance of quantitative geography, President Conant decided to discontinue the study of geography at Harvard. As a result, some aspects of physical geography were left to the Geology Department to teach (where they are still taught), but the rising field of social science geography was discontinued. As a result, Harvard missed the development of quantitative geography, geospatial analysis, and geo-informatics. The sorts of courses that one might expect a geography department to provide cannot be found at Harvard: geographic data analysis, behavioral geography, economic geography, urban geography, mapping, spatial modeling, remote sensing, etc." and that, "Harvard's [current] situation is complex...there is a growing interest among students and faculty in spatial analysis but...there are no established means for offering instruction in quantitative geography or spatial analysis...[and] It is worth noting that courses in spatial analysis and GIS labs are common at publicly funded universities. There is a growing demand for graduates with GIS skills and the NSF funding for applied and theoretical work in spatial analysis is increasing." The new Center for Geographical Analysis at Harvard will go a long way toward rectifying past deficiencies and meeting this new demand at Harvard.

The Center has strong potential to expand and grow. You can imagine the thrill I felt a few months ago, after the Center's Director Peter Bol wrote to me with the exciting, but then still not public news that "The university has agreed to fund the Center out of its own resources (and that any gifts would be incremental!) and it looks like we are on track to creating the first professorship. There is tremendous enthusiasm among faculty and adminsitration...I thank you for your support and advice. Getting faculty is the crucial step toward reviving geography at Harvard, once we have one person we can start to add more and out of that will come a program and eventually perhaps a department. We are at a moment of sharply growing awareness of why geographic knowledge matters to all that we do... I will be asking your advice in greater detail in the coming months."

It has been a long process of hard work by many to reach this milestone for geography at Harvard, and I'd like to thank Peter Bol in particular for his leadership during this process, and for his breadth of vision for the Center, and for the program and department to follow. And Peter, you can count on the AAG to continue to support your efforts every step of the way as Harvard and geography set out on this new journey together. Thanks for starting the AAG's centennial years with such gratifying news.

outside of serving on NRC committees or writing best-sellers. John Adams gives frequent talks on "how metropolitan regions work" to legislative committees, foundation boards, city councils, the print and broadcast media, policy conferences, planners, and neighborhood groups. Adams characterizes his talks as "public geography" in which he discusses the impact of policies on land use, transportation, poverty, housing, and neighborhoods. Alan Taylor has researched the use of prescribed fire to meet ecological or other management objectives in the Lake Tahoe basin and in Lassen National Forest. His work has been used to help formulate policy on ecosystem restoration in fire-prone forests. Alan also serves as an instructor at National Advanced Fire and the Resources Institute in Tucson. Kathy Hansen and Karl Birkeland are researching how snow stability varies in time and space on mountain slopes for the purpose of improving avalanche forecasting. The results have been provided directly to avalanche forecasters and their methods are being shared with researchers in Canada, Switzerland, Austria, and India.

The Applied Geography Conferences have provided a forum since 1978 for interaction between academic geographers and practitioners in business, industry, government, and education. Burrell Montz and Graham Tobin have served as co-Executive Directors for many years, carrying on the torch from Andy Schoolmaster and John Frazier before that. Since 2004, John Wertman has served the AAG as its "Washington Monitor." John keeps an eye on government activities of interest to geographers, including agency funding, appointments, congressional hearings, and legislation. The AAG has acted proactively on selected issues, consistent with its mission, on scientific freedom, and issue of data collection and management at the Bureau of Labor and the Census Bureau. The AAG has organized two congressional briefings in 2005, one on May 23 on "the State of Democracy-Engaging a Changing Citizenry," and a second on June 14 on "Building

Geographic Management Systems." The AAG sponsored book, *WorldMinds*, details geographic solutions to 100 problems ...many of which involve public policy.

GIScience has increased the influence of geography in public policy by leaps and bounds. Instructive case studies are described in the ESRI booklets, GIS in Public Policy and Zeroing-in: Geographic Information Systems at Work in the Community.

Some of my own research, in collaboration with colleagues and students, has exerted some affect on public policy. One study on the effects of army tank maneuvers on wind erosion provided the data that could be used to alter U.S. Army policy on scheduling the location and timing of war games at Fort Bliss Military Reservation. A study on the effects of Jackson Lake Dam on the Snake River in Grand Teton National Park vielded results that could be used by the National Park Service to approach the Bureau of Reclamation with proposals to alter the timing and magnitude of reservoir releases in a manner that could optimize conditions for fish, bald eagles, moose, safe recreational boating, or biodiversity at the landscape and species levels. Results from our study of disappearing glaciers in the Wind River Range of Wyoming helped document the what portion of water supply was generated from glaciers, and the prospects for losing that source of later summer water for downstream users in upcoming decades. The State of Wyoming is now looking again at proposals for weather modification to enhance winter snowfall in the mountains. A study in the Routt-Medicine Bow National Forest revealed that timber harvest only accelerates mass movement in one of twenty-six landtype associations (composites of geology, landforms, soils, vegetation), which were mapped using GIS. This influenced the decision-making about where clear-cut logging would be allowed.

Geography is the original environmental science. By combining our old "muddy boots" tradition of field work with newly acquired skills in GIScience, we have much to contribute to the public policy arena. We understand that the landscape operates differently when considered as a whole than would be predicted by adding-up the effects of its innumerable, individual parts. We can explain the policy ramifications of the place-dependency of processes, the interlocking of processes at multiple scales, and the integration of spatial and temporal analysis. But first...you have to want to enter the arena. Be mindful that science is not the only basis for forming public policy. Others include common sense, trial-anderror, professional rubrics (e.g., best management practices), direct experience and beliefs, standard business practices, voting, and lawsuits. Let's remember the words of Saul Cohen, "One of the marks of the value of a scholarly discipline is the extent to which it has something to say about matters of social significance."

Lightfoot Discusses NSF Research Directions

On October 31, in remarks at the annual meeting of the Consortium of Social Science Associations (COSSA), David Lightfoot, Assistant Director of the National Science Foundation (NSF) for the Social, Behavioral, and Economic Sciences Directorate (SBE), highlighted the work of SBE and the foundation as a whole and made specific reference to several areas where the discipline of geography has taken a leadership role.

At the outset, Lightfoot mentioned the NSF's involvement in the federal response to the Hurricane Katrina disaster, in part through the agency's Human and Social Dynamics (HSD) priority area. Under HSD, the foundation has issued several time-sensitive awards for researchers to get into the affected areas quickly. In addition, several NSF-funded scientists have used existing grant monies to undertake research projects in Gulf Coast communities. As part of these activities, geographers are taking lead or key supporting roles with multidisciplinary teams to conduct important and timely interdisciplinary research. Specific information about the awardees and their projects should be available within a few months after awards have been finalized.

Lightfoot additionally discussed the priority the NSF and SBE in particular have placed on forming collaborations between directorates and encouraging inter-, multi-, and trans-disciplinary research. As an example, he noted that the geography program and geographers have been very successful in working with and receiving funding from the foundation's Environmental Research Directorate.

Also chief among the agency's cross-cutting priorities has been work in the cyberinfrastructure field. Owing to the importance of computing and information technology to new methods of exploration and inquiry, NSF has decided to make a major coordinated cvberinfrastructure. investment in Lightfoot explained that the geographical sciences are ahead of other SBE programs in terms of responding to this priority because of the importance and rapid rise of geographic technologies, such as integrated GPS/GIS systems.

Census, NSF Receive Budget Increases

As Congress completes its work on the FY 2006 federal appropriations bills, there was good news for both the National Science Foundation (NSF) and the Census Bureau's American Community Survey (ACS).

The Conference Committee on funding for Science, State, Justice, and Commerce provided \$5.654 billion for NSF. This is approximately 3.3 percent above the FY 2005 funding level and is a boost of \$50 million over the president's budget request. The Census Bureau's ACS, meanwhile, which has faced elimination on a yearly basis since it was adopted to replace the Census long form, was funded at a level of \$169.9 million. This sum will enable the bureau to keep the ACS in operation for at least another year. (For more on the ACS, please see the January 2005 edition of this column).

The AAG has written numerous letters and also worked closely with the Consortium of Social Science Associations, the Coalition for National Science Funding, and others in Washington to promote federal investments in research and geographic data collection. Given the current budget climate in Washington, we and other science and social science data advocates were quite pleased with how both the NSF and the Census Bureau fared.

reorganized or relocated, and even though there were serious setbacks for most enterprises, the reinvestment and real estate boom that followed during the 1870s and 80s only served to spur further growth in the city's publishing and cartographic businesses. As the nineteenth century wound to a close, map firms consolidated and took advantage of economies of scale and scope to create a corporate model of map publishing, remnants of which can be seen today. It was during this period that such well-known firms as George F. Cram & Co., R.R. Donnelley and Sons, and Rand McNally & Co. became nationally dominant in the commercial and transportation atlas and map trade. As might be expected, the expansion of the mapping industry in Chicago over the last half of the nineteenth century is closely related to the expansion of rail transit across the continent, and maps such as Rand McNally's New Railroad and County Map of the United States and Canada from 1876 (see illustration) are fine examples of this early railroad cartography.

The prominence of Chicago firms in the map publishing industry has extended through the present day. As perhaps the best-known of Chicago's map publishing firms, Rand McNally bears special mention. William Rand founded a print shop in the city in 1856—only eight years after Chicago's first railroad. After hiring Andrew McNally, an Irish immigrant and skilled printer, the two men took over the printing operations for one of the city's newspapers, the *Chicago Tribune*. The partnership was cemented shortly thereafter in 1868, and soon after that the company

began publishing maps as part of their railroad guides. Company lore holds that Rand saved the presses in the 1871 Great Fire by burying them in sand. Following expansion after the fire over the next decade, they became the largest publisher of maps in the U.S., initiating the Business Atlas (later renamed the Commercial Atlas and Marketing Guide) in 1876. They began producing maps and globes for schools in 1880. The McNally family purchased full control of the company in 1899 and managed the firm through most of the twentieth century. Rand McNally moved into publishing auto maps and guides early in the age of automobiles, school atlases like Goode's World Atlas-published since 1922, and more recently they have marketed interactive city street guides, web-accessed road construction information, and real-time traffic information delivered to mobile phones. After the McNally family sold the company in 1998 to AEA Investors, Inc. and following a series of bad business decisions, the company filed for Chapter eleven bankruptcy in 2003. Rand McNally is now headquartered in north suburban Skokie.

During the twentieth century, well-known firms such as A.J. Nystrom (1901), Replogle Globes (1930), and the Encyclopedia Britannica (1923) added their names to the roster of Chicago firms involved in the map trade. As the mapping industry has shifted to digital processes and new products over the past few decades, most Chicago firms have moved to participate in this market as other firms have arisen in response to this perceived opportunity. New firms include NavTeq, a Silicon Valley startup that relocated to Chicago and is based in the "Merchandise Mart," located just minutes from the conference hotel. NavTeq has 1,800 employees worldwide and delivers digital products that power in-dash navigation systems, fleet management systems, location based services, handheld and wireless location systems, and other spatially sensitive applications. A tour of NavTeq is in the works for the 2006 AAG meeting.

Of course, Chicago is also home to many famous map collections, including the Newberry Library collection, which covers the history and literature of the civilizations of Western Europe and the Americas from the Middle Ages through World War I and features such rarities as fifteenth-century sea charts and a first edition of the Theatrum Orbis Terrarum, the first modern world atlas. The University of Chicago Libraries is home to an outstanding map collection which, though it is closed to the general public, may be available for an AAG tour through special arrangement. The Chicago Historical Society also houses a noted map collection, and is located close to both the Newberry Library and the AAG conference hotel. Additionally, nearby at the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee are the archival AGS/AAG collections in the Golda Meir Library. Field trips are planned to both the Newberry Library (60 W. Walton St., www.newberry.org) and the AGS/AAG archives.

Michael R. Talbot is a full-time geography faculty member at Pima Community College, where in six years he expanded the program from three courses to eleven, and tripled the student enroll-

ment from approximately 100 to 300. Mike has held previous teaching appointments at the University of Arizona and Western Michigan University. Prior to earning his bachelor's from Michigan State University and his master's degree from Western Michigan University, he spent two decades in public service and private enterprise conducting civil engineering and surveying work, and eventually also GIS. His research has focused on medical geography, particularly communicable diseases in tropical environments. Mike lives in the triple-digit temperatures of Tucson, Arizona, with his wife, daughter, and son.

AAG: What inspired your interest in geography?

Mike: That goes back to grade school my 5th grade teacher, one day a week would quiz the class, row by row—I really enjoyed it. About there it ceased, and I didn't come into contact with geography again for a long time.

AAG: Where did you re-encounter it?

Mike: I was doing civil engineering and surveying work in the Virgin Islands, and these amazing new things called computers entered into the picture, first with automated mapping and then this new technology, GIS. In 1989 after Hurricane Hugo, we moved to Michigan, and I inquired about where to learn more about GIS. I was told it was taught at Michigan State in the geography department. I said, "Oh, I love geography!" and became hooked on a new career.

AAG: How did you go from civil engineering to teaching geography?

Mike: Well, I enrolled into the program and then was exposed to the rest of the discipline—physical and human and all its depth and thought it was fascinating. I was asked to teach a course at Western Michigan University, where I had my graduate studies. If I had known back in the 70s that I would enjoy teaching so much, I would have pursued it thirty years ago.

AAG: Now you are building a major community college geography program. Mike: Geography has not been on their radar screen but enrollments are changing that; now we are at 300. Six years tripled the numbers.

AAG: How did you get enrollments to expand?

Mike: A few reasons, starting with the cooperation of the dean and administration; without their assistance, it would have been difficult. I agreed to hold larger class sizes, so that meant finding a larger classroom and a more permanent one. Now, instead of being "on wheels," geography is located in one classroom where I have room for more students, but also the supporting educational material that is so important in our discipline.

AAG: What else?

Mike: We now hold more sections of physical geography, but also expanded the range of courses from three to eleven. Also we offer a variety of topics—including some that overlap with other disciplines, like the map reading class for the archeology technology program. I would like to teach the medical geography course that I have in the catalog for nursing and health science students. It is already approved by the curriculum committee, but I can't find the time to teach it since I already have five or six physical, cultural, and world regional classes each semester.

AAG: What other advice could you give to those looking to expand their programs?

Mike: Make sure that classes can be accepted as part of a statewide transfer program. Create a kind of pathway program that they transfer as either a science or social science elective. I always make sure that my major courses fall into that, because students pick from that list.

AAG: How do you ensure you have the resources?

Mike: Geography is like a cash cow now, making the division money through enrollments. I can now ask for things—like I got a weather station and some local TV types are going to incorporate our weather station data into some of their broadcasts. I now have about twenty computers for GIS and a lot of support materials. I went from not having a budget to them saying, "you just tell us what you need."

AAG: How do you manage the schedule?

Mike: It's the fourth largest community college in the country and I'm the only full-time geographer in the whole multi-campus college. But things are running along on all cylinders now. Where else can I go to work five days a week, have fun, and twice a month somebody puts money in the bank for me? When you enjoy what you're doing, it's not like working for a living.

AAG: Does your former engineering work and experience play a role in your teaching? Mike: It gives me a different mindset. The little bumps that happen don't get me riled. My perspective is I've got the best job in the world. I also learned a long time ago to focus on those things that are within your realm of influence and not worry about what you can't change.

AAG: What else is within your realm of influence?

Mike: Sharing the wonders of our discipline, which is so fascinating, with the uninformed, and of course with my students I have a captive audience. Nobody enters college wanting to be a geographer, so we have to toot our own horns for students to give us a look. I made it my mission to make the student population aware of our discipline and the employment benefits that are associated with it. That's what brings the converts in.

AAG: What do you tell students to convert them?

Mike: I take my intro day to give an overview of the discipline and talk about how these skills can help with careers and make you a better hire. They say, "I really enjoyed this—can I really get a job doing it?" For those with the desire, it is always a possibility. Plus I get so many students that come in geographically illiterate they are the people you see on Leno when he is on the street—I don't want my students to be one of those.

Geographic Research Supports Action Against Predatory Lending

esearch by geographer Steve Graves (California State University-Northridge) and law professor Christopher Peterson (University of Florida) has aided a recent series of legislative actions across the country against predatory payday lenders who swarm around U.S. military bases. The pair's research, soon to be published by the Obio State Law Journal, garnered a great deal of national publicity (see the Members of Note section, page 17) and following a major story in The Military Times, attracted the attention of the Pentagon and Congress.

Graves and Peterson's study has helped fuel congressional action, including the introduction of the Servicemembers Anti-Predatory Lending Protection Act (H.R. 97) by Rep. Sam Graves, Missouri Republican. This measure would limit

interest rates to thirty-six percent for consumer credit extended to a service member and their dependents, and if passed, would authorize a fine or up to one year imprisonment (or both) for lenders who violate the interest cap. "The really interesting thing is how [politicians] often noted the power of the maps to bring into to focus the magnitude of the problem" said Graves. A note from a congressional staffer of Congressman Sam Graves (no relation to the researcher) reported, "Your maps are doing wonders. I have been able to get six additional co-sponsors in three days. It's been amazing."

Also, an amendment to the Senate Defense Authorization bill (S. 1042), sponsored by North Carolina Republican Sen. Elizabeth Dole, would limit interest rates to thirty-six percent on loans offered to military personnel.

Local ordinances on predatory lending to the military have been passed in Jacksonville, FL and in Arizona. And according to Steve Graves, "Christopher and I have already submitted testimony to the legislature in Virginia, giving our expert opinion on their payday lending laws, and the state of Georgia has completely outlawed payday lending." The state of Washington has invited Graves to offer testimony for a Senate bill under preparation, and Graves said that in addition to requests for additional resources and maps from congressional offices, the FDIC, and several governors, that the U.S. Department of Defense is also interested in the pair's findings.

hicago is home to a host of art galleries, history and science museums, architecturally famous buildings, live theaters, performing arts centers, famous comedy clubs, and a world-class aquarium and zoo. The Chicago Field Museum has a special exhibition running during the time of the AAG Annual Meeting entitled "Pompeii: Stories from an Eruption." Investigate the fascinating events of life in Pompeii before the tragic eruption of AD 79 (www.fieldmuseum.org/pompeii/about.asp).

Minutes from downtown Chicago are two architectural wonders designed by **Frank Lloyd Wright**, widely regarded as America's most influential architect. Wright's first Home and Studio is located in Oak Park, Illinois, and the Robie House is located in the Chicago neighborhood of Hyde Park. Tours of both locations may be arranged and details are available at www.wrightplus.org/tours/tours.php.

The **Shedd Aquarium**, now celebrating its 75th anniversaray, has permanent exhibits of the aquatic life of Caribbean coral reefs, the Amazon River, and Pacific rocky coasts. Daily events include viewing divers as they hand-feed animals in the coral reef exhibit and presentations of marine mammals such as dolphins and whales.

During the first weeks of March (when the AAG is in Chicago), admission to the **Museum of Science & Industry** is free on Monday and Tuesday. The museum's most popular exhibits include a German U-505 submarine, "The Living Heart: cardiovascular images by Alexander Tsiaras," the Pioneer Zephyr—a 1930s streamlined passenger train, and an "omni-max" theater which shows films on a seventy-two foot diameter dome approximately five stories tall and made of perforated aluminum.

On nearby North Dearborn Street, the **Goodman Theatre** will host performances of *A Life in the Theatre*, David Mamet's funny and loving

look at actors. Tickets go on sale January 16, see www.goodman-theatre.org/ ticketing.asp for details.

Several other theaters such as the Ford Center/Oriental Theater, Cadillac Palace Theater, and the Auditorium Theater feature **Broadway-style musicals**. For specific shows and information visit www.broadwayinchicago.com.

Launched in 1959, **The Second City** is a comedy theatre that launched the careers of such comic greats as John Belushi, Mike Myers, Bill Murray, and Gilda Radner. Nightly comedy shows are offered: see www.secondcity.com/ ?id=theatres/chicago for more information.

Chicago's Lincoln Park Zoo will be open during the AAG meeting and the

Trimble, associate professor of geography at UCLA, was invited to the annual meeting of the Institute of British Geographers at the University of Leicester January 5-8, 1981 where he would be the annual guest of the British Geomorphological Research Group...Peter О. Muller (PhD, Rutgers), formerly of Temple University, assumed the position of Chairperson of the University of Miami Department of Geography on August 15, 1980. Muller's two forthcoming books, Contemporary

Suburban America and Economic Geography (co-authored with J. Wheeler), would be published in early 1981...Ashok K. Dutt, professor of geography and urban studies, University of Akron, was organizing the 1981 Planning Seminar in the Netherlands and Belgium for the sixth year in a row...Melvin G. Marcus (Arizona State) reported that the International Mountain Society, would begin its first full year of activity on January 1, 1981. Its aim was to help achieve a better balance between mountain environment, human welfare, and the

development of natural resources by encouraging basic and applied interdisciplinary research throughout the mountain world, by disseminating knowledge and its application to the solution of mountain land-use problems, and by developing a mountain ethic among all sectors of society who use and appreciate mountain lands... **Richard Peet** reported that **Antipode** was in a process of radical change with a commitment over the following two years to achieve a far higher level of radical scholarship while maintaining links with a broad spectrum of left perspectives.

Grants and Awards

David Carr, assistant professor of geography at the University of California, Santa Barbara (UCSB), received a National Institutes of Health Career Development Award of \$486,518 in support



of the research project, "Migration, Demographic Factors, and Deforestation in Guatemala." He also received a National Science Foundation Geography and Regional Science grant of \$116,370 in support of the research project, "The Underlying Causes of Tropical Deforestation: Rural Migration and Environmental Degradation in Guatemala." Carr also recently received a UCSB Faculty Career Development Award and a UCSB Senate Faculty Research Grant in support of this research and a UCSB Instructional Improvement Award (\$4,527) to develop a new course in Latin American Geography which will be launched in the winter 2006 quarter. The objective of the NIH and NSFfunded projects is to investigate the primary proximate and underlying demographic forces behind deforestation in Guatemala's agricultural frontier region of Petén.

Professor **Wendy Wolford** of University of North Carolina, Chapel Hill, received a grant from the National Science Foundation for the project "Grounding the State: An Institutional Ethnography of Agrarian Reform in Brazil." The grant totals \$140,000 and will run for three years.

The West Virginia Geographic Alliance received a \$64,000 Grosvenor Grant from the National Geographic Society for a project to help high school students further understand the essential geographic connection between society and the environment by examining the connections between development (sprawl and mining) and plant communities and by participating in discussions on sprawl and voting behavior. Concord University is the host institution for the project. Professor **Scott Kirsch** of University of North Carolina, Chapel Hill, has received a two year grant for \$52,000 from the National Science Foundation. The project, "The National Map in a Global Age: A Study of Science, Territoriality, and Governance in the U.S. and Philippines during the Late 19th and Early 20th Centuries," is funded jointly by NSF Geography and Regional Science along with Science and Technology Studies.

Sarah Witham Bednarz, Texas A&M University, is the PI of a group receiving a three-year, \$1,477,280 grant from the GK-12 program of the National Science Foundation. The program, "Advancing Geospatial Skills in Science and Social Sciences," connects geospatially skilled graduate and advanced undergraduate fellows with science and social studies teachers, grades six to twelve, in a collaborative three-year cycle to enhance teacher and student knowledge and skills in spatial thinking. Co-PIs are Andrew Klein, Anthony Filippi, and Robert Bednarz, all in the Department of Geography at Texas A&M.

University of North Carolina (UNC) Charlotte geographers, Owen Furuseth, Laurie Garo, and Thomas Ludden were awarded \$37,707 in continued funding from the U.S. Department of Justice for work in the Western (Judicial) District of North Carolina. This team of researchers is a Research Partner for Project Safe Neighborhoods (PSN), an interagency hand gun violence reduction program. Over the past three years, UNC Charlotte has received \$149,000 in funding to design and implement program evaluation tools, including crime analysis with GIS, and targeting strategies for the PSN efforts in Charlotte, North Carolina.

Professor Martin Doyle of University of North Carolina, Chapel Hill, is in the first year of a National Science Foundation career grant entitled "CAREER: Influence of geomorphic complexity on stream ecosystem function." The grant totals \$405,000 and runs from 2005-2010. Francis Harvey, associate professor of geography at the University of Minnesota, received a \$174,927 grant from the National Science Foundation for his project "Administrative Technologies and the Governance of Agrarian Reform: Liberal Modernization of the Polish Cadastral Infrastructure." This project will run from September 2005 through June 2008.

Professor Larry Band of University of North Carolina, Chapel Hill, is one of five co-Pls on a National Science Foundation Biocomplexity (Coupled Human and Natural Systems) Grant for \$1,400,000 over three years. The project, "Feedbacks Between Complex Ecological and Social Models: Urban Landscape Structure, Nitrogen Flux, Vegetation Management, and Adoption of Design Scenarios," is a collaborative project with researchers at the Institute for Ecosystem Studies, Yale University, and the U.S. Forest Service.

Amy Ross, assistant professor at the University of Georgia, recently began research on the International Criminal Court as it investigates its first two cases in Uganda and the Democratic Republic of Congo. Ross received funding for this project from the University of Georgia's Center for Arts and Humanities.

University of North Carolina, Chapel Hill assistant professor **Conghe Song** has been awarded the Bullard Fellowship in Forest Ecology at Harvard. Song is this year carrying out research on remote sensing of forests and ecosystem modeling at the Harvard Forest in Massachusetts.

A team from Texas A&M University including **David Cairns** and **Charles Lafon** (Department of Geography), in collaboration with **Robert Coulson** and **Maria Tchakerian** (Department of Entomology), and **Richard Feldman** (Department of Industrial Engineering) received funding from the USDA Forest Service for a study that uses a modeling-GIS approach to investigate southern pine beetle outbreaks on forested landscapes of the southeastern U.S. The title of the

Marc P. Armstrong, professor, and David A. Bennett, associate professor, in the University of Iowa (UI) Department of Geography, received the 2005 UI President's Instructional Technology Innovation Award, which recognizes the most creative use of technology in teaching in the past year. The award includes a \$3,000 prize. Armstrong and Bennett were honored for their work in the "development of a mobile, geographically based environment for learning." In creating their Mobile Geographic

Education system, the use of GPS, GIS, wireless communication, handheld or tablet computers, and centralized computers working as servers were integrated to bring the classroom computer laboratory, library and Internet into the field using existing mobile computing technology.

ach year, the AAG confers three book awards, the John Brinckerhoff Jackson Prize, the Meridian Award for the Outstanding Scholarly Work in Geography, and the Globe Book Award for Public Understanding of Geography. Nominations are now invited for these awards, and should be submitted by December 31, 2005.

AAG John Brinckerhoff Jackson Prize for 2005

The AAG's Jackson Prize was established to encourage and reward American geographers who write books about the United States that convey the insights of professional geography in language that is interesting and attractive to a lay audience. The prize, which carries an award of \$1,000 to the author, is for a book published during the calendar year 2005.

J. B. Jackson founded the magazine Landscape in 1951 and remained its owner and editor until 1968. After he retired as editor, he spent more than a decade writing about landscape and teaching celebrated courses in the history of vernacular landscapes at Berkeley and Harvard. The Jackson Prize of the AAG is dedicated to encouraging the kind of thinking and writing to which J.B. Jackson devoted much of his life: to encourage Americans to look thoughtfully at the human geography of their own country; to try to understand how that geography came to be and what it signifies; and to convey that understanding to the public at large.

Eligibility: J.B. Jackson and his friends established the prize to recognize American geographers who write serious but popular books about the human geography of the contemporary U.S. The prize is restricted to books written by geographers, with preference given to those by U.S. citizens or permanent residents. Textbooks, dissertations, and articles are ineligible. Special consideration will be given to books that are carefully designed, appropriately illustrated, and physically appealing. The selection committee reserves the right to make no award in a particular year. Awards are announced in conjunction with the Annual Meeting of the AAG.

Birthplaces of AAG Members in 1961

o what extent did AAG members born in rural and small town counties influence the systematic and regional specializations of members at mid-century and beyond? This and a number of other fascinating questions about disciplinary history (personalities, fields of inquiry, international career paths, etc.) surface from even a casual look at the data from the 1961 AAG Handbook Directory which recorded the birthplaces (towns, cities, and states) for 1,379 geographers born in 601 U.S. counties. (The 1961 edition was the last directory to provide such detailed information.)

The leading birth cities were New York (85) and Chicago (73) followed by Cleveland (21), Detroit (19), Los Angeles (18), Washington, DC and Worcester (17 each), Philadelphia (16), and Boston (15). The leading states were: Illinois (174), Pennsylvania (96), Ohio (89), Michigan (73), and California (67). The directory also lists 264 members born in 44 different countries; the leading countries were Canada (61) England (42), Germany (25), China (16), and India (13). Almost sixty percent of members were born between 1920-39 and eighty percent from 1910-39.

The accompanying map clearly illustrates the strong rural and small town base for U.S. born AAG members. Especially dominant were states in the Northeast and New England and the central and eastern Middle West, as well as the northern Great Plains. Very few AAG members were born in states south of the Ohio River. In fact in the South, even Florida, had only a dozen or fewer. On the West Coast, those counties containing Los Angeles, San Francisco, and Seattle were nearly as strong as large metropolitan areas in the Northeast and Middle West.

These patterns beg several questions including: to what extent did those born in rural and small town counties of birth influence the systematic and regional specializations of AAG members at mid-century and beyond? We know the middle decades, and before, of the last century were important times for those studying agricultural geography and rural

settlement. Were most of these studies, including those who completed theses and dissertations, also conducted in the Middle West and Northeast? We also know that many of the early and strong doctoral programs were also in these regions, including Chicago, Michigan, Wisconsin, Minnesota, Illinois, Nebraska, Clark, and Columbia. Did the faculty in these departments also come from the Northeast, Middle West, and Northeast? Were most of the theses and dissertations in these departments by students who hailed from the same regions? I suspect so. Where did the first urban and industrial geographers come from? Were they born in counties with large cities and industrial economies? Where did the first quantitative geographers come from? For example, did Wisconsin and Michigan departments compete for and attract students who came from Minnesota, Iowa, Illinois, Indiana, and Ohio? Did Nebraska do the same for the Great Plains? Did Clark and Columbia attract students mostly from the Northeast and New England? And what about the departments at Chicago and Berkeley? Were these departments and universities with strong extraregional networks for students and faculty? What universities attracted the most international students? Did they attend Chicago, Berkeley, Clark or Yale, Penn, and Harvard? Where did those from Britain and Canada train in the U.S.?


What precisely were the "recruiting regions" of the MA and PhD programs early last and at mid century? What were the recruiting patterns for those employed in private and teachers colleges during the 1950s? Did these programs, which were the "seed beds" for many MA and doctoral programs, have most of their faculty born within the region they taught? What universities recruited the first large numbers of women and minorities?

Other demographic and institutional questions also arise. Where were most of the women AAG members in 1961 born? Did they attend regional or extraregional universities? Where there any salient birth county patterns to those geographers who were employed by the U.S. government, the military, or the private sector? Where did most AAG officers prior to 1961 come from? Was there a strong bias in favor of Middle West and Northeast universities? What AAG divisions were poorly represented in AAG officers and editors prior to 1961?

This map also triggers interest in an array of questions about career paths. I can imagine there are geographers who basically "stayed in place" (that is, the same place/region) much of their career while others became extraregional during early, or latter, parts of their professional lives as remained committed to studying, traveling, and conducting research outside the U.S. If we could plot the birth places of these "types" of scholars, government and private sector employees, what would they look like?

If we could prepare a map of the counties and countries of birth of AAG members in 2005, we would likely note some major differences from four decades earlier. I suspect we would observe many more born in the Sunbelt states and in metropolitan areas. I do not know what kind of patterns one would observe for counties of birth for current female and male AAG members. I would expect the number of Asian-born AAG members would exceed those born in Europe. Where are most of our African American and Hispanic American members born? In Sunbelt states or mostly in large metro areas in the Northeast, West, and Middle West? Finally, it would be worth comparing the birth counties and states for other disciplines at mid-century. I would suspect that there would be many similarities between the patters for geographers, sociologists, anthropologists, economists, historians, and political scientists. I hope that this map will stimulate additional disciplinary and interdisciplinary inquiries into the nature of what we study, our institutional (departmental and university) histories, and also regional and extraregional networking which are so important in anything we do.

Racial Exclusion Erupts into Violence In France

s October turned to November an ominous note sounded in Europe. Paris was shaken by rioting in its suburbs by "alienated, ethnic minority youth," to quote the lead from a *Guardiam* of London newspaper story of November 4. It began to appear that we had in European cities a certain parallel to what we know only too well here: the alienation of

younger blacks and Latinos, isolated in decaying central cities from the (predominantly white) middle-class mainstream.

Except that in the French example, minority young people are not stuck in slum reservations in the old hearts of their cities, but are warehoused in apartment blocks, "projects" (*HLMs*) in the suburban circle (*banlieue*) around Paris. Geographically, the situation is turned inside out: here the doughnut hole, there the doughnut ring. But the misery is much the same: a BBC reporter described these neighborhoods as beset by high unemployment, drugs, gangs-in other words the same syndromes that we know from cities on our side of the Atlantic.

We wonder if the American media have largely missed an important element of this story. Where they have described the rioting of ``immigrant youth,'' have they missed the racial dimension? These are not just immigrants to France, but African and North African immigrants, that is, people who in American eyes are non-whites.

France's admirable official policy is to welcome all immigrants and to render them wholly French, expressly without distinction according to origin, color or creed. Thus during the boom years of the 1950s, Portuguese and Spanish and Italians came and settled. In public discourse they are not often termed "immigrants"; their children, and now their grandchildren, are viewed as perfectly French. One such is the current tough-talking minister of the interior, Nicolas Sarkozy.

But "non-whites," who mainly came with the end of France's African colonial empire in the 1960s, have not been "inserted" or "integrated" so amiably. London's *Guardian*, again, referred to the accidental deaths of "two North African boys" as the immediate spark for the rioting. However, according to the official French view, these youths were French, not North African. It's just that much of mainstream France will not desist from labeling second- or even third-generation people as "North African," and thus from implying clearly that they and other "non-whites" are not really French.

The years of economic boom have come and gone. At ten percent, France's

general unemployment rate is twice that of the United States. In the suburban public housing projects, it's double that. Among the black and brown youth of visibly immigrant descent, who frequently underachieve in the public high schools, it is yet higher. Hanging out on the corner in one's cite can easily lead to petty "anti-social" acts (overturn a tombstone or two), to gratuitous public discourtesy, then perhaps to street crime, and thus to generalized racial stereotyping of miscreant "Arab Youth."

Not all, but most of these young people are running up against the same exclusions and denial of access to the societal mainstream that we often see in operation domestically. There has been a corrosive anger among these young people simmering just below the surface in France. The riots then are not just the work of delinquent "scum" (Minister of the Interior Sarkozy's chosen term) or of criminal gangs, or of the other usual suspects, but may well be signs of a deeper malaise which the Chirac government is now beginning to see as a true societal and political crisis.

It is not just color that sets off the excluded. Another signal marker is that of Islam, as seen in the ongoing controversy over young Muslim girls being prohibited from wearing the veil to school. This past July one of us (Western) was interviewing people of recent immigrant origins in the suburbs of the eastern French city of Strasbourg. In one public housing project, a Muslim man said to him, "When I go

home in the summer, I'm a stranger. Here, I'm a stranger. How are the kids going to make sense of this? We have no homeland. North Africans here feel rejected. So you get the violence, the automobile torchings. The kids do all this crap so that people will take some notice of them."

In another suburban housing project, Hautepierre, where, friends tell by phone, the other night fifteen parked cars were torched, a young Frenchman of Turkish (thus Muslim) heritage confirmed that "some of the young here are not participants in the life of the city. They are not integrated into its life, they don't feel as if they are French citizens. They feel excluded here. They wear T-shirts saying 'Turkey' or 'Morocco,' but if they went there they would not fit in and would be excluded there too. They have no landmarks, no moorings."

Policy-makers in Paris and Washington must be asking themselves, what are the odds on this disaffection morphing into "Islamic extremism"? After all, if these kids are not buying into (or being allowed to buy into) our high-consumption society, what's to prevent them from strapping on backpacks and going for excursions on the Paris metro, like their brethren did in London?
