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The U.S. Board on Geographic Names: Committees to Meet at the AAG

The U.S. Board on Geographic Names (BGN) consists of officials from ten U.S. government departments and agencies. The BGN will hold its regularly scheduled committee meetings in conjunction with the AAG Annual Meeting. Both The BGN Domestic Names Committee meeting (10:00 a.m. – 12:00 p.m.) and the BGN Foreign Names Committee meeting (1:30 p.m. – 3:30 p.m.) are open to the public and AAG attendees are welcome to attend. This is an opportunity to witness how place names are standardized for official use within the U.S. government. The Board's decisions influence what names appear on the maps of many of the world's most prestigious English-language cartographies. Come see toponymy in action.

ESRI Sponsors \$20,000 Student Social Media Challenge at 2010 AAG Meeting

ESRI is sponsoring "Analyzing Volunteered Geographic Information " a social media challenge open to all students attending AAG 2010.

All participants in phase 1 will receive an ESRI coffee mug, with approximately 20 winning entries in phase 2 receiving cash prizes ranging from \$500 to \$5,000.

Phase 1 involves Tweeting basic data on social contacts made during the meeting ("talked to a professor about thesis topic") and posting them to the web in a common volunteered geographic information (VGI) cloud map.

Phase 2 challenges participants to analyze all of the social data collected and draw conclusions or tell a story (when, where, who, what happened) about the patterns, quantity and quality of the social interaction and knowledge

The Presidential Plenary session features the leadership of geographers on each of the four interdisciplinary panels of "America's Climate Choices" and offers an inside view of this important national effort. "America's Climate Choices" is a major study of the National Academies of Science. Responding to a request from Congress, the four panels are developing recommendations for what can be done to limit the magnitude of future climate change, adapt to the impacts of climate change, better understand climate change and its interactions with human and ecological systems, and inform effective decisions and actions related to climate change. Geographers Marilyn Brown (vice chair of Limiting the Magnitude Panel), Tom Wilbanks (vice chair of Adapting to the Impacts Panel), Diana Liverman (vice chair of Informing Effective Decisions and Actions Panel) and Billie Turner (member, Advancing the Science Panel) will discuss the scope and emphasis of each panel and the roles of geographers in the important work of shaping America's response to a future affected by climate change.

Access to potable water will likely be the defining geographical crisis of the twenty-first century. The purpose of this address is to argue, first, that the water problem is predominantly a political one in which democratic politics can in fact work to achieve outcomes other the choice between destruction and despair that seems most popular these days; and second, that we have trouble recognizing this because we have views about politics, and not just in relation to water provision, that either subordinate it to various natural or economic forces or trivialize it in a populist vein as corrupt, venal, and compromised. The word "compromise" is seen in a particularly negative light. "All or nothing" is the leitmotif of most of what goes for what politics should be. The possibilities of actual political processes, formal and informal, excite limited interest. Self-defined radicals and conservatives alike passively wait for their various "end times." Too often the attitude is: if I don't get everything, then I'll take nothing. For water's sake we must take politics more seriously. The AAG Presidential Achievement Award also will be presented to Professor Peter Meusburger prior to the Past President's Plenary.

World-renowned primatologist, anthropologist, environmentalist, and humanitarian **Dr. Jane Goodall** will be presented with the inaugural AAG Atlas Award. This new award is designed to recognize and celebrate outstanding accomplishments that advance world understanding in exceptional ways. Widely recognized for her groundbreaking study of chimpanzees, which she began in Tanzania in 1960, Dr. Goodall is a renowned advocate for conservation and environmental causes. The award presentation will be followed by an address entitled, *Gombe and Beyond: The Next 50 Years*, to be delivered by Dr. Goodall to a gathering of geographers, media members, and other meeting attendees.

The year 2010 marks a monumental milestone for the Jane Goodall Institute (JGI) and its founder, Dr. Jane Goodall, DBE. Fifty years ago, Goodall, who is today a world-renowned primatologist, conservationist and UN Messenger of Peace, first set foot on the shores of Lake Tanganyika, in what is now Tanzania's Gombe National Park. The chimpanzee behavioral research she pioneered there has produced a wealth of scientific discovery, and her vision has expanded into a global mission to empower people to make a difference for all living things. While the original research was conducted using binoculars and notebooks, half a century later this long-term study employs state-of-the-art geospatial technologies such as QuickBird satellite imagery (DigitalGlobe) and ArcGIS tools (ESRI) to monitor chimpanzee habitat inside and outside the park.

Ottoman Map Exhibit: From Piri Reis to Katip Çelebi: The Ottoman Worldview

The maps will be on display from Thursday, April 15 at 6:40 p.m. through Sunday, April 18 in the AAG Exhibit Hall *(Exhibit Hall A, Marriott, Exhibition Level)*

This year's Exhibition Hall at the AAG Annual Meeting will feature a display of more than forty reproductions of 16th and 17th century maps and manuscripts by influential Ottoman Turkish cartographers from Piri Reis to Katip Çelebi. These documents have been touring the U.S. as part of the UNESCO Katip Çelebi Year and are being brought to the AAG Annual Meeting with the assistance of the Turkish Ministry of Culture and Tourism and of Bahçeşehir University, Istanbul.

Many consider the most important work of geography written in the 17th century to be *Displaying the World*, by Katip Çelebi (1609-1657). The volume consisted of two parts: the first dealing only with seas, rivers and islands; the second with continents, cities, and countries. Intended as a book of general geography, *Displaying the World* contained maps of the known world, including America, Africa, Asia, Europe, and other regions. Reproductions of these important maps will be on display in the AAG Exhibition Hall.

The exhibition also includes the world maps of Piri Reis. These are the most important Ottoman naval and cartographical works of the 16th century, presented by Reis to Suleiman the Lawgiver in 1526. Despite being prepared in the traditional style, these works are portolan maps based on personal experience, observation, and earlier maps from the East and West. Although they lack longitude and latitude lines they are significant for their precision and accuracy, and represent well the remarkable skill and creativity of the Ottoman cartographers.

Earth System Monitoring Using the Earth Trends Modeler

This workshop explores earth system monitoring using the *Earth Trends Modeler* (ETM) software system. ETM provides a range of space/time analysis and modeling tools. The implementation of REDD projects requires a best estimate of the deforestation and/or degradation baseline. The baseline is derived from the spatial modeling of the expected future trends of deforestation using maps of historical deforestation and biomass estimates.

Land Change Modeler (LCM) is a robust modeling tool that allows calibration, validation and the creation of maps of expected future deforestation trends. Clark Labs, in conjunction with Conservation International, has designed a REDD tool within LCM which guides the user through the steps of baseline development and directly produce tables and graphics necessary in the reporting process.

This workshop will cover the complexity of REDD baseline creation using real case studies to illustrate the process.

Studies reveal a relatively rich landscape of international research collaboration among Geographers of the Americas, however, joint authorship in scholarly publications is quite low. Co-written journal articles turns out to be a very poor measure of collaboration by a full degree of magnitude less than other indicators. These data point to the need for encouraging greater co-authorship of research that is being conducted in collaborative ways. This workshop thus seeks to support Latin American and collaborating scholars in understanding how to publish their collaborative research in academic journals, and explores best practices for joint publication across borders.

Simple Tools for Lake and Watershed Assesment

This course continues to be updated. It is a full-day, problemoriented, introduction to a suite of simpler tools from the Army Corps of Engineers that are used to assess lake and reservoir water quality in a watershed context. We use the remodeled FLUX32 mass tranport software as a basis for discussing watershed delivery, stream transport, and load estimation. FLUX32 is a Windows® application with a user friendly interface and continuing enhancements. Both new and experienced FLUX users will want this new version. From FLUX and mass transport, we move to a discussion of in-lake trophic response using the Windows version of the Bathtub model. Finally, we will use the new software package called TASTR (Trophic Assessment Screening Tool for Reservoirs), to illustrate an integrated watershed-reservoir assessment. TASTR uses the Bathtub model, simple watershed models and a selfcontained GIS capability to put the reservoir (or lake) water quality into a watershed context. TASTR lets the user quickly (but with low resolution) and easily explore a lake's potential trophic response to changing conditions or operations. TASTR's capabilities also let it serve as a convenient "front end" for Bathtub modeling and as a license-free, stand-alone, GIS tool for performing basic geospatial tasks.

A CD will be distributed that includes all course notes and copies of the software. **Participants should bring a laptop to the workshop.** Software will be provided to registrants prior to the conference (via FTP, or CD) and MUST be installed and tested by the participant prior to the workshop (simple instructions included).

The instructor (Dave Soballe, Ph.D.) is a senior researcher with the U.S. Army Engineer Research and Development Center (ERDC) Environmental Laboratory in Vicksburg, MS. Dave has taught versions of this course at NALMS for the last four years and has over 25 years of experience with reservoir and watershed processes and assessments.

This workshop draws on research findings by the AAG's Enhancing Departments and Graduate Education in Geography (EDGE) project with regard to how graduate students perceive issues related to departmental climate, such as intellectual qualities of the curriculum; social relationships among students and faculty; openness to diversity; mentoring and advising relationships; and experiences with the overall working environment. When viewed in aggregate, geography graduate students have mostly favorable impressions of their graduate programs. However, there are significant differences in students' perceptions of departmental climate when they are compared on the basis of gender, race, program type, and other variables.

In this workshop, participants will review a sample of EDGE research findings and consider ideas for taking actions that might enhance practices, solve problems, or otherwise result in improvements and change at the departmental level. Participants will also discuss what further actions and research the EDGE project might undertake that would result in data and materials that would be helpful for graduate programs.

WileyPlus is an ideal platform for developing an online human geography course. Mike Kuby is now in his third semester teaching it online. Departing the Marriott promptly at 7:45 am., we travel west to I-270 toward Frederick, MD, and cross the Piedmont. Near Frederick, we will follow US 340 south into VA, to Harper's Ferry. There we catch a shuttle to the historic area. Afterward, we proceed via WV 230 to Shepherdstown, follow MD 34 to Sharpsburg and MD 65 to Antietam. We return to Washington D.C arriving about 6 p.m.

Lee's army met Union forces at Harpers Ferry, VA. and Antietam, mid September, 1862. We examine site and situation of Harper's Ferry, the Potomac and Shenandoah juncture, well preserved downtown, the battle, and physical geography. At Antietam, we have an overview by a ranger, then visit a number of important sites on the battlefield.

Participants must prepare for temperatures from 45-80° F and rain with layered clothing and sturdy shoes. A box lunch, snacks, and drinks will be provided.

From DC's Dairy to DC's Wine Country: the Changing Agriculture of Loudoun County, Virginia

The afternoon will feature trips to Corcoran Vineyards and Fabbioli Cellars, two of Loudoun's 24 wineries, and the historic village of Waterford.

Human-Nature Interaction on the Eastern Shore of Chesapeake Bay

This fieldtrip explores the various layers of human interactions with the decidedly non-urbanized Eastern shore of the Chesapeake Bay, which provides a stark contrast to the heavily urbanized Western shore. From a historical and scalar perspective, we look at different layers of human patterns dating from the oldest town in MD (established in 1635) to the ultra secluded enclave of wealth at St. Michael's island, to Cambridge, and a water-based boat economy. We will explore the cultural landscape evidenced by a mosaic of forest, agriculture, and suburban development. Lastly, we will take in the Eastern Shore both as a nature lover's paradise with its bay, rivers and wetlands (the Bay Country), and as manufactured landscape dotted with pine plantations and industrial scale chicken farms. Each layer of culture and economy of this 'outback to the East Coast' generates unique expressions on the landscape and varying impacts on the water quality of the Chesapeake bay.

Post-Tobacco Southern Maryland: Agricultural Heritage and Transition

Southern Maryland's agricultural economy was dominated by tobacco production until 2000, when the state of Maryland instituted a buyout program to effectively end tobacco production in the state. The region has experienced significant residential and commercial growth in the past 50 years. The disappearance of the region's cash crop, coupled with development pressure, has prompted the region to focus on conserving its agricultural landscapes by rethinking its agricultural economy.

In this field trip, we will learn about the challenges and opportunities that have come as a result of the tobacco buyout. Site visits will include a briefing by the Southern Maryland Agricultural Development Commission, a former tobacco farm that has transitioned into new ventures, value-added processing on an Amish farm, and a vineyard that is part of a regional effort to develop a wine industry. Wear sturdy shoes for tromping around farms and outer layers appropriate for the unpredictable, but generally pleasant Southern Maryland weather of mid-April.

This field trip crams DC into a day, revealing the stories and symbolism of the city in the monuments, buildings and landscapes that have accumulated within the ten-mile square district that functions as the nation's curio cabinet. Long walks and short rides will be required to cover ground that will include L'Enfant's baroque circles and boulevards, the Federalist streets of Georgetown, the venerable edifices of Pennsylvania Avenue, Victorian era romantic eclecticism, Beaux Arts neoclassicism of Daniel Burnham and

James McMillan, the monumental structures of the National Mall, and the full spectrum of 20th century modernity from Art Moderne to postmodernism. Lunch in a genuine Washingtonian food court. **Please bring \$10 for lunch.**

Columbia Heights; Gentrification, Immigration, Segregation, and Historic Victorian Homes

We will be looking at gentrification and the recovery of the city 40 years after the riots that burned it down. There are issues of immigrant populations, long time lowincome residents, and upwardly mobile residents who have all made this their home. We will look at architecture and urban planning from the turn of the century and compare it to the new architecture and city designs that are sharing the same space. Meridian Hill Park sits on 16th St. 16th St. was planned to be the prime meridian before the world agreed Greenwich. U St. was historically a segregation line and was locally known as the "Black Broadway". It was the center for the arts in African-Americans across the nation and we will look at the changing dynamics. The trip will end with a meal in "Little Ethiopia". Participants should expect to spend approximately \$15.

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
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



EXHIBIT HALL FLOOR PLAN



Access to potable water will likely be the defining geographical crisis of the twenty-first century. The purpose of this address is to argue, first, that the water problem is predominantly a political one in which democratic politics can in fact work to achieve outcomes other the choice between destruction and despair that seems most popular these days; and second, that we have trouble recognizing this because we have views about politics, and not just in relation to water provision, that either subordinate it to various natural or economic forces or trivialize it in a populist vein as corrupt, venal, and compromised. The word "compromise" is seen in a particularly negative light. "All or nothing" is the leitmotif of most of what goes for what politics should be. The possibilities of actual political processes, formal and informal, excite limited interest. Self-defined radicals and conservatives alike passively wait for their various "end times." Too often the attitude is: if I don't get everything, then I'll take nothing. For water's sake we must take politics more seriously.

World-renowned primatologist, anthropologist, environmentalist, and humanitarian **Dr. Jane Goodall** will be presented with the inaugural AAG Atlas Award. This new award is designed to recognize and celebrate outstanding accomplishments that advance world understanding in exceptional ways. Widely recognized for her groundbreaking study of chimpanzees, which she began in Tanzania in 1960, Dr. Goodall is a renowned advocate for conservation and environmental causes. The award presentation will be followed by an address entitled, *Gombe and Beyond: The Next 50 Years*, to be delivered by Dr. Goodall to a gathering of geographers, media members, and other meeting attendees. The year 2010 marks a monumental milestone for the Jane Goodall Institute (JGI) and its founder, Dr. Jane Goodall, DBE. Fifty years ago, Goodall, who is today a world-renowned primatologist, conservationist and UN Messenger of Peace, first set foot on the shores of Lake Tanganyika, in what is now Tanzania's Gombe National Park. The chimpanzee behavioral research she pioneered there has produced a wealth of scientific discovery, and her vision has expanded into a global mission to empower people to make a difference for all living things. While the original research was conducted using binoculars and notebooks, half a century later this long-term study employs state-of-the-art geospatial technologies such as QuickBird satellite imagery (DigitalGlobe) and ArcGIS tools (ESRI) to monitor chimpanzee habitat inside and outside the park.

In her lecture, *Gombe and Beyond: The Next 50 Years*, Dr. Goodall will reflect - both personally and professionally - on the meaning of the past five decades, the extraordinary changes the world has seen since 1960, and the impact these changes have had on people, animals and the environment we all share. In addition, she will discuss the role we must all play over the next 50 years to ensure a better future for generations to come. The villagers of Daru Fippu are empowered to manage their forests by Senegal's decentralization laws. They want the forests for local use, but the Forest Service's Mega Bank project convinces the villagers to participate in charcoal production to make money for local development. The forest service says they must cut the forests for charcoal to supply cooking fuel for the city. The foresters speak of management, but insist only on production. They speak of participation, but the villagers participate only as labor. They speak of development, but foresters block them from lucrative forestry markets. Villagers are only allowed to produce at low prices and sell their charcoal to urban merchants at the forest edge. Foresters refuse to give them production quotas and permits to sell for much-higher prices they could get in the city of Dakar. When the sympathetic project director, Mbaxan, tells them they can get ten times the price selling in the city, the villagers are shocked. Mbaxan tries to help the destitute villagers to profit from their rich forests, but is stymied by the Forest Service. They make some headway, but not enough. The villagers of Daru Fippu federate to fight for their rights.
